PERSONAL CARE BAGS FOR CHRISTIAN LIFE CENTER

Aug. 18, Sunday service will be shortened so that we can all participate in a mission project that was a real success last year. Christian Life Center distributes personal care bags to homeless or others in need so that they can take a shower at the Baptist facility, and they need help providing the personal supplies to give to those who need them. On the tables in back of the sanctuary is a list of the toiletries that we hope to provide this year. There are ways you can help with this project. (1) You can give financially to help pay for the personal care items by giving a donation in the gold envelopes provided on the back tables in the sanctuary and placing it in the offering. It would be helpful to receive these funds by Aug. 18. If we don't get all the funds, the remainder will come from the mission and outreach budget. (2) If you are unable to give financially, you can still remain after church on Aug. 18 and help us assemble the bags. It took a little fewer than 30 minutes last year to fill 100 bags. Following this activity, we will have lunch and a time of fellowship. Pat Rockas and the hospitality committee will have a sign-up sheet beginning July 28 for the following items: sandwiches, salads, sweets, iced tea and lemonade. Even if you don't bring a dish, come anyway because there is always more than enough.

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CALLED CONGREGATIONAL MEETING ON AUGUST 11TH

There will be a brief meeting of the congregation during worship on August 11 for the purpose of electing three members of the congregation to serve on the Nominating Committee. This committee has two elders and three members of the congregation who are charged with the responsibility to fill open positions in the Foundation and Session for the coming year (2025). Please make note of this date and be present so that you can have a vote in who represents you on this important committee.

PROPERTY COMMITTEE SUMMARY

One of the busiest committees of Session is the Property committee who oversees the church facility and all its contents. We are proud to be such an old congregation, having celebrated 240 years of ministry in this community, but with age comes many problems when it comes to upkeep of a building. Something always needs fixing, and since we sold the Academy, we have been able to devote some funds to getting our building repaired. Recently, two of the outside walls were repainted which involved a lot of work for Trevor Blevens' paint crew. If you've looked at the results, you know they did an outstanding job of scraping, sealing, and then painting 3 coats on the walls. All of this was done as contracted before the June Harrodsburg 250th Anniversary celebration. Then, one of the air conditioning units for the sanctuary died, and a new one had to be purchased. The other three units are the same age, so we just pray they hold up for a while longer. The side entrance door from the parking lot has weathered and the frame rotted. Justin Lay's company will be installing the new door before this newsletter is published. The inside needs some painting as well. Patrick Holt should be doing this work in the near future. As you can see, there are many projects for the property committee to address.

When the Academy sold, it was with the clear understanding that the proceeds would be used to upgrade and repair our facility. We put \$75,000 into an account to use for as many repairs as it would fund; we invested the other \$75,000 in stock, which is now with Schwab. We had to sell a small number of the stock to complete payment for some of the above major repairs, but we still have about \$71,000 of our investment in stock. That stock is now worth \$187,938.08 which is an increase of over \$110,000. Isn't that amazing? Doug Ferguson gave us some leadership with identifying some stock with potential, and his advice was very good.

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PROPERTY COMMITTEE SUMMARY, CONT'D

Property hopes to identify other projects that need to be addressed to get our building in good shape, so we will probably need to sell more stock to finance these projects. Just know, we are aware of the responsibility involved in being good stewards of the congregation's assets and will always try to get the best work for a reasonable price. If you see things you feel need repair, just let one of the property chairs know, Gordon Woodard or David Lynn.

FINANCIAL REVIEW SUMMARY

In May, Stewardship and Finance Committee enlisted the help of 5 people, some internal and others external, to look at our financial reports of the past year. Two reviewed Foundation and were assisted by Jack Prewitt, Treasurer of Foundation; three reviewed the General Budget and Special Account (restricted funds) for efficiency and accuracy of records. Overall, the reviewers were impressed with the record-keeping of both the Foundation and the General Budget though there are a few recommendations that were given and will be followed up on. The three reviewers of the General Budget and Special Account were highly satisfied with the Treasurer's, (Pat Alexander) attention to detail and accuracy in record- keeping. They felt she is to be commended for doing such a proficient job for more than forty years. The reviewers found UPC financials to be managed in an excellent and responsible manner that maintains individual confidentiality while providing transparency to the Session, a summary of quarterly income/outgo through the newsletter, and the end of the year report in the Annual Report to the congregation.
